WHICH BUSES CAN I USE?

Sunday Rover tickets are valid on most buses in Herefordshire and Worcestershire on Sundays and Bank Holiday Mondays. The following services were included in the scheme as at July 2009. The ticket is valid on the full route of all services, including journeys to or from neighbouring counties.

Excluded Services

There are a small number of services on which Sunday Rover tickets cannot be used:

Diamond Bus services 51, 57, 57A, 58 and 58A in the Redditch area

National Express West Midlands services 27, 35, 47 and 49 in north Worcestershire

The ticket cannot be used on any National Express coach service or on special rail replacement bus services

WHERE TO GO



THE MALVERN HILLS (TIC 01684 892289)

A mountain range in miniature, views from the summit ridge are magnificent, stretching west to the Black Mountains and east to the Cotswolds. On their eastern flank is Great Malvern, with superb Georgian spa-town architecture, formal gardens and surviving mineral water Wells. To the west are

Colwall and West Malvern, quieter settlements amidst wooded pasturelands. The highest hill, Worcestershire Beacon, is easily reached. Alight from the bus at Wyche Cutting and walk north; from the summit descend to St. Ann's Well and central Malvern. The most spectacular is Herefordshire Beacon, capped by an Iron Age fort called British Camp; from Wyche Cutting walk south to the Malvern Hills Hotel.



HEREFORD (TIC 01432 268430)

At the heart of the City is the Cathedral, housing the famous Mappa Mundi and a Chained Library. From here, narrow streets and walkways radiate to Wye-side walks and to the commercial core, High Town, with its fine half-timbered Old House and the Buttermarket. The City Museum is housed in an ornate building in

Broad Street. Just outside the ring road is the Museum of Cider and Offa Distillery on Grimmer Road.

LUDLOW (TIC 01584 875053)

The greatest of the Marcher Castles dominates the town, with streets tumbling from the market place to the ancient bridges across the river Teme. Next to the castle is St Laurence's Church, one of the finest in England. The medieval, grid-iron street pattern

begs to be explored, lanes and alleys overhung by venerable old buildings dart between the town walls, elegant Broad Street and the Butter Cross, near the famous Feathers Hotel. Beyond the town fringes rise the wooded heights of Mortimer Forest. Try a walk to the viewpoint at Whitcliffe, above Dinham Bridge, for a stunning panorama of the ancient hill town.

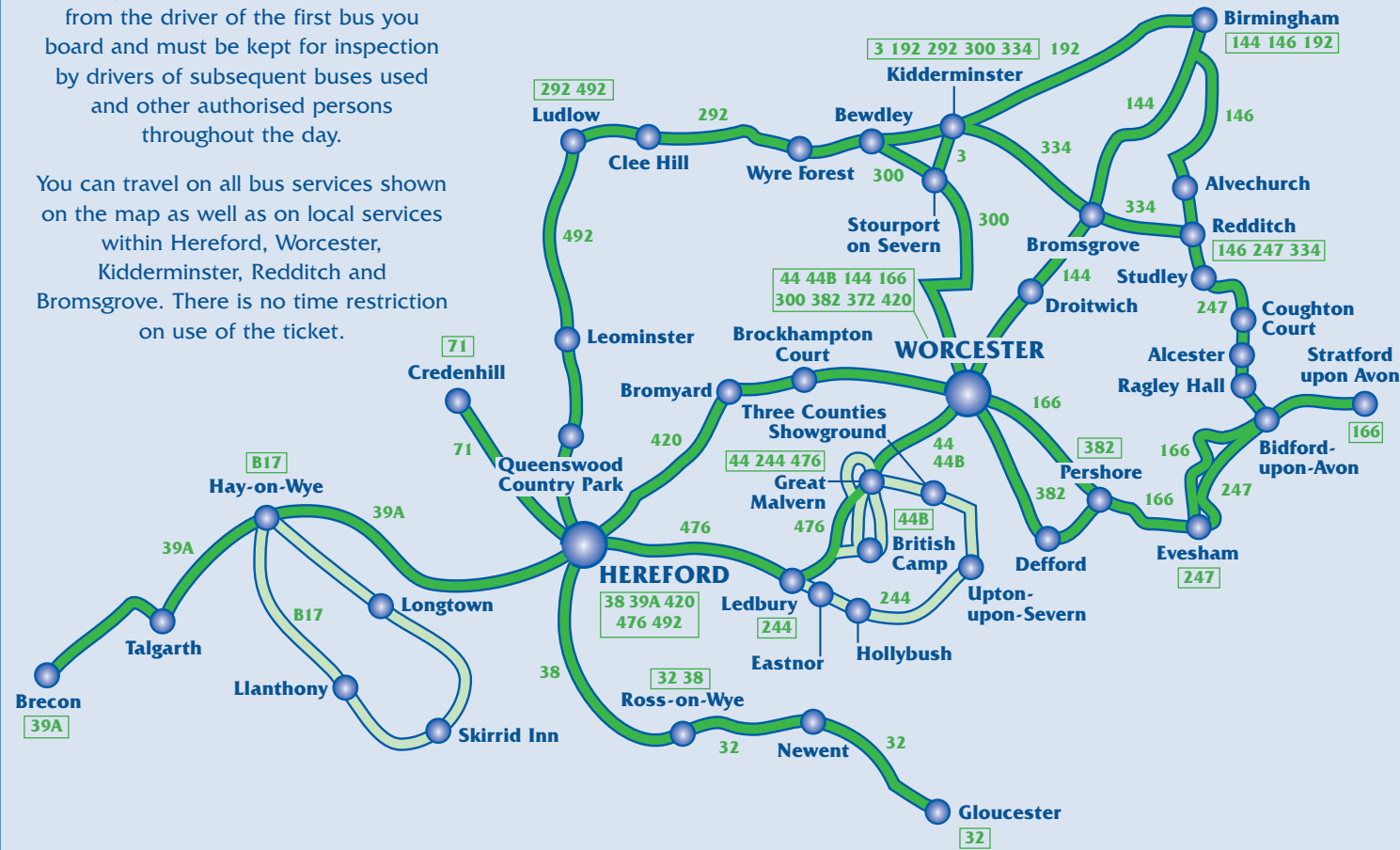


The Sunday Rover ticket offers unlimited bus travel for one day on most bus services in the counties of Herefordshire and Worcestershire (including many cross-boundary services to neighbouring counties) on Sundays and Bank Holiday Mondays. Tickets should be purchased from the driver of the first bus you board and must be kept for inspection by drivers of subsequent buses used and other authorised persons throughout the day.

You can travel on all bus services shown on the map as well as on local services within Hereford, Worcester, Kidderminster, Redditch and Bromsgrove. There is no time restriction on use of the ticket.

WORCESTER (TIC 01905 726311)

Here is England's most perfectly sited cricket ground, beside the river Severn and overlooked by sublime Worcester Cathedral. Started in 1084, it has the tombs of King John and Prince Arthur, Henry VIII's older brother. Close by is The Commandery, a range of medieval buildings with a Civil War Centre recalling the epic 1651 battle. A short walk away are High Street and the shopping centre, dotted with fine old buildings including the Guildhall and Greyfriars. Just south of the Cathedral Close is the Worcester Royal Porcelain Visitor Centre on Severn Street. River trips can be taken from North and South Parades.



BRECON & THE BLACK MOUNTAINS (TIC 01874 622485)

Homely Brecon nestles between the shapely Brecon Beacons and the mysterious Black Mountains. A ramble from the TIC passes the sublime St John's Cathedral, adjacent Priory Groves woods, the South Wales Borderers Museum with its absorbing Zulu War displays and the city's grand Regency architecture. The Brecknock Museum in the old Shire Hall draws these themes together, whilst a boat trip on the canal is ultimately relaxing. Beacons Bus B17 (summer only) threads through the remote Black Mountains past ancient castles and churches, haunting abbey ruins and drover's pubs amidst superlative scenery once enjoyed by the famous diarist Francis Kilvert and writer Bruce Chatwin.



GLOUCESTER (TIC 01452 421188)

The National Waterways Museum is at the heart of the old docks, now a cosmopolitan setting for museums, cafés, bars and designer retail outlets just off Southgate Street. The Cotswold stone Cathedral is superb, with renowned cloisters, East Window and the tomb of the ill-fated King Edward II. Nearby in College Court is the Beatrix Potter Museum, whilst on Westgate is the half-timbered Bishop Hooper's Lodging and the Folk Museum, with a fascinating history of the Severn, its distinctive vessels and fisheries. Dating from 1457, the New Inn on Northgate Street is one of England's best-preserved medieval courtyard inns.
