

# WHAT IS AN **APPRENTICESHIP?**

### An apprenticeship is a real job

Available to individuals aged 16+ (with no upper age limit), apprentices are typically employed for at least 30 hours per week.

# Apprenticeships range from level 2 to level 7

There are apprenticeships at levels equivalent to GCSEs right up to Master's Degree level, see the table on the next page for details.

# Apprentices will spend 80% of their time on-the-job

80% of an apprentice's paid time will be spent on-the-job, working with colleagues to learn new skills and gain experience of the workplace.

### Key facts you need to know

of at least the National Minimum

£4.81 per hour from April 2022.

### Apprentices do not pay for their training

All apprenticeship costs are paid for by the employer and/or the government meaning that an apprentice will never have to pay for their training.

# Apprenticeships last a minimum of 12 months

Most apprenticeships take between I - 4 years to complete. It will depend on the level and delivery model of the apprenticeship.

# Apprentices will receive 20% off-the-job learning

20% of an apprentice's paid time will be spent undertaking off-the-job learning, gaining valuable skills and qualifications.

### WHAT LEVELS ARE THERE?

There are various levels of apprenticeship to apply for depending on current skills and qualifications. Apprenticeships have equivalent educational levels:

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Degree

6 and 7

Bachelor's or master's degree

All apprenticeships include elements of on the job and off the job training leading to industry recognised standards or qualifications. Some Apprenticeships will require an assessment at the end of the programme to assess the apprentices ability and competence in their job role.

#### How do you apply?

At any one time there are between 12,000-20,000 apprenticeship vacancies available online in a variety of careers and industries across England. Visit **GOV.UK/apply-apprenticeship**. You can search by keyword (job role, occupation type or apprenticeship level) and by location.

Once the right job comes up, you can simply register on the website and follow the step-by-step instructions to apply for the role.

If they are not quite ready for an apprenticeship or job, they could try a traineeship with a local employer to gain valuable work experience and the opportunity to improve their English and maths, if needed. #### **Entry requirements**

Apprenticeships are available to anyone over the age of 16, living in England. All vacancies on Find an apprenticeship will clearly state what the entry requirements are for the job role being advertised. There will be different entry requirements depending on the industry, job role and apprenticeship level.

#### **Making Connections**

Research and building up your knowledge is an important part when considering an apprenticeship. It is good to speak with training providers, local employers and apprentices to find out more about what is on offer and how their programmes work.
