INTRODUCTION

With over 31,000 universities in the world, just shy of 300 in the UK and 12 located in the West Midlands there are thousands of employment options.








TASK 2

Note: Teachers/career leads would benefit from organising a visit with the widening participation team prior to visiting, organising entrance to various parts of the campus, also allowing them to set up conversations with some employees.

If you manage to visit a local university campus or one far away why don't you think about, finding and asking the following:

All universities have campus maps to help students, staff and visitors find their way around. You may also find larger maps located around the campus to give a clear view of where you are.

1. Start by locating one of these maps to support your tour.

Student services and facilities offer a huge number of roles for employment.

- 2. Have a look around and see if you can find any of these and identify some of the different roles.
- 3. See if you can speak to any employees to find out how they got their job and what their skills maybe?

With a campus that allows the students to stay on site you will find housing. Universities take care of the upkeep and maintenance of this accommodation.

- 4. If possible, see if you can look inside any or around the grounds.
- 5. You may find people working, ask them some questions about their roles? And if they like their jobs? You could even find out what qualifications they may have?

Universities operate utilising a large amount of office staff, these roles are varied from organising events to Human Resources (HR).

- 6. If possible, have a look around an office or reception area allowing you to see a few of these roles.
- 7. Speak with an employee to find out more about their roles.
- 8. Finally list of all the different roles you witnessed along with all the different facilities and sectors of employment.
