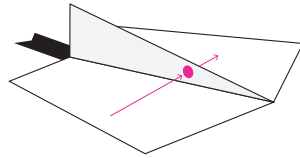
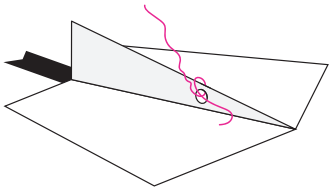


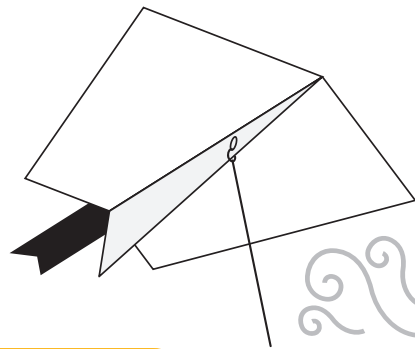
7. Turn your kite over (so the TOP SIDE is facing down). Lift your folded flap up so it resembles a shark fin and make a hole all the way through the black circle with a hole punch or sharp pencil.



8. Carefully tie one end of your string in a knot through the hole you've made. Make sure you don't tie the knot too tight as it will rip the hole when the kite is flying (you can make your hole stronger by adding some sticky-tape once string is attached)



9. The creative bit! Time to decorate your kite using pens and pencils.



10. You're done! Holding the string you've attached to the flap, pull your kite towards the direction of the wind so that it catches and flies!

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Let's go fly a kite!

How to make a simple kite that actually flies.

WHAT YOU NEED:

- An A4 piece of paper
- A piece of string (at least 2 metres)
- A stick (a wooden kebab sticks work really well)
- Ribbon or thin piece of fabric (at least 30 cm)
- Hole punch (or sharp pencil)
- Sticky-tape
- Pens or pencils to decorate
