This email relates to clarification in respect of Adam Mindykowski 's email below.

Planting mitigation and phasing

I can confirm that the submitted scheme will be restored on a phased progressive basis.

The Initial works will involve the planting of new and beating up of existing hedgerows, as well as the establishment of the avenue planting. Following on from this, as soon as each of the individual phases has been extracted and the restored landform completed, seeding and planting works will take place in these areas - during the appropriate first available planting season. This will help ensure that minimal land is disturbed at any one point in time.

Specifically in respect of the eastern mineral extraction boundary (part) of planting block W1 has already been planted, the remainder would be planted as part of the Initial Works phase, along with the re-establishment / beat up of Hedgerows H1 and H2. This being ~ 7.75 years in advance of when mineral extraction would progress into Phase 5, which is adjacent to this boundary. This will provide sufficient time to allow this planting to establish and to screen any potential views into the site from the Castle Barns area and further afield to the east. In respect of the south eastern area of the eastern boundary, screening mitigation is to take the form of a temporary seeded and maintained soil bund (Bund 18). The bund being established utilising soils from Phase 4. There is therefore no requirement for additional screen planting along this boundary as described and illustrated within the submitted Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment Report. On final restoration, once Bund 18 is removed, a hedgerow will be planted along the removed bunds alignment to help integrate the final restoration landform and land uses. Temporary Bund 18 will be seeded and farmed, merging into the eastern ridge, whist screening lower quarry operation to the west.

The Avenue

It was suggested within the application that two potential species could be used for the avenue planting as the currently remaining avenue trees are not of a single species. If however one species is required, as per Hereford and Worcestershire Garden Trust and Adam Mindykowski 's comments, we would plant native Beech as per HWGT suggestion and as stated within the application. I can confirm that the remaining avenue trees will be protected in full accordance with BS 5837:2012.

Existing trees

I confirm that appropriate good practice guidelines / targets for beat up would form part of both a LEMP and CEMP as is normal as part of a condition of planning permissions for a developments of this nature.

Management planning and aftercare

Within the application we have stated that, as is required under a mineral scheme, a 5 Year Aftercare and Management Plan will be produced and implemented. A guide for this being submitted in respect of planting establishment and management within the Restoration section of the application. It is also stated within the application that to ensure the long term establishment and quality of restored habitats, seeding / planting and amenity uses, that a Long Term Management Plan will be produced as part of an appropriate condition. We are content with a 10 Year period if this is what is requested.

I hope that the above information provided sufficient clarity and certainty in respect of the proposals at tis point.

Thank you for reconsulting me on this scheme and for granting an extension for return of comments.

Planting mitigation and phasing

I welcome the applicant's confirmation that planting along the eastern boundary will be prioritised (post-consent), and note that a native woodland block will also be planted along the western boundary of Phases 2 and 3. While this is welcomed, it appears that the bulk of restoration planting will be undertaken post-extraction. I remained concerned that the opportunity to restore progressively following completion of each phase has not been addressed or explored. I acknowledge there may be operational constraints that apply some limitations to restoration during the lifecycle of the site (if that is the case these should be set out). Phase-by-phase restoration is recommended in order to begin the establishment of new planting at the earliest opportunity. This would benefit the aims of the scheme to create new

parkland planting, and with native trees forming such an important part of the overall site assemblage. The site sections submitted by the applicant have proven helpful in understanding the site topography following restoration. What it demonstrates very clearly is that (despite the grading of the proposed finished level) how significant the reduction in level will be compared with the current baseline. With that in mind, I would suggest the applicant revisits the scope of mitigation proposed for the eastern boundary with a view towards providing additional planting to soften the visual impact from receptors to the east. In time, this will also contribute towards the overall landscape framework of the new parkland.

The Avenue

The Avenue is one such example that should be prioritised for restoration at the commencement or early in the operational lifecycle of the site. I agree with comments submitted by Hereford and Worcester Gardens Trust (HWGT) concerning the intention to restore the feature with mixed native species. Species diversity may be preferable in the context of hedgerow and woodland restoration, but in the case of a parkland avenue, single species planting should be applied in order to ensure the uniformity typical of this feature type is restored. The Avenue should also be afforded an appropriate buffer to secure its protection during the lifecycle of the quarry. I note the matter of the bund raised by (HWGT), and recommend this is addressed by the applicant.

Existing trees

I welcome measures aimed at ensuring the retention and protection of trees: T4 T5, T19, T22 and T25. These trees will need to be secured within the context of an adequate RPZ/buffer. I support the comments submitted by my Ecology colleague, Cody Levine, and his recommendations for appropriate measures to be included with a CEMP. I also support my colleague's suggested amendments to the LEMP in order to secure targets of success as set out in his response.

Management planning and aftercare

I previously raised the matter that post-restoration establishment and aftercare should be secured over a plan period covering a minimum of 10 years. The submitted plans, by contrast, are set within a 5 year time-frame. I recommend this is revisited by the applicant, not least given the restoration aims of the scheme are focused on the delivery of significant landscape, habitat and amenity enhancements centred on the creation of a parkland landscape. These are long-term ambitions that would be secured more effectively within the context of an extended management plan period. You will recall I consulted you on the above application for planning permission in February 2020.

Following the consideration of the comments that were received on the application and Environmental Statement, the County Council wrote to the applicant in June 2020 requesting further information in respect of the Environmental Statement. On 27 October 2020 the applicant submitted the requested further information, and the County Council are now seeking comments on this further information in relation to a number of matters including: water environment, ecology and biodiversity, landscape, agricultural land classification and soils, cultural heritage, transport movement and access, rights of way, and restoration and aftercare.

The applicant is seeking planning permission to extract approximately 3 million tonnes of sand and gravel over a total of 6 phases. The land would be progressively restored using site derived and imported inert material to agricultural parkland, public access and nature enhancement. The applicant estimates the development would take approximately 11 years to complete.
