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NATIONAL NEWS & UPDATES

How well do you prepare your learners for adulthood?

It has been nearly nine years since the ideas around Preparing for Adulthood from the Early Years (PfAEY) emerged and the expectations on schools to prepare all young people for adult life through personal development have grown in that time.

Preparing for Adulthood is what all schools do for all young people – but that offer is not always drawn together and recognised. The refreshed 'Preparing for Adulthood from the Earliest Years' Review Guide was trialled with schools in Oxfordshire who found that taking part in the process resulted in:

- A clear focus and drive for school improvement
- More widely shared expertise and good practice
- Better understanding of the rationale of PfAEY
- A clear and strategic vision for embedding PfAEY
- A named PfAEY governor.

In a <u>new blog</u>, a WSS Deputy Regional SEND Leader shares her experiences of carrying out a PfAEY Review as part of the trial - the aspirations behind it, the process involved, and the advice she'd give to others considering the activity.

As part of the Universal SEND Services programme, WSS will be recruiting 80 nursery, primary, secondary and school sixth form settings to carry out a review in the Autumn term of 2023. Settings will receive training and support to carry out the review and will be encouraged to produce an analysis report and action plan. Participating schools may also have an opportunity to cascade PfAEY training and support to a partner school next year.

Family Carer Support Service

LOCAL NEWS & UPDATES

Update on Worcestershire's SEND Accelerated Progress Plan (APP)

The November 2021, area reinspection of SEND identified that progress had been made in addressing eight of the significant weaknesses identified at the initial inspection and four areas of weakness remained outstanding. An outcome of this revisit inspection was that the Local Area was required by the DfE and NHSE to produce an Accelerated Progress Plan (APP) to demonstrate how this would be addressed.

The four remaining areas of weakness are as follows:

- The variation in the skills and commitment of some mainstream schools to provide effective support for children who have SEND
- The lack of suitable specialist provision to meet the identified needs of children and young people
- Fragile relationships with parents and carers and a lack of meaningful engagement and coproduction and collaboration
- The poor quality of Education, Health and Care Plans (EHC Plans) and limited contributions from health and social care along with the process to check and review the quality of EHC plans.

A recent summary of the progress to date was presented to DfE/NHSE colleagues during the 12month review held on 29 March 2023. This outlined the progress reached at the 12-month review stage.

The outcome of this latest review stage has resulted in a letter sent by the DfE SEND Regional Lead to the Director of Children's Services and the Chief Executive of the Integrated Care System for Worcestershire which can be downloaded from our <u>Google Drive</u>.

The letter recognises the "vast amount of work that has taken place" and the value of the contributions particularly from parent carers and school representatives. The letter includes the detail of evidence that demonstrates accelerated and continued improvement. The outcome of this letter is that the DfE have included a range of further evidence they would like to be presented to demonstrate further development and embedding of change. A further review meeting is scheduled for September 2023.

All our practitioners hold additional Braille or BSL qualification and are highly experienced and skilled in their field, ensuring settings continue to meet their statutory duties.

Parent Carer Engagement in Schools Toolkit

Members of staff from the All-Age Disability Service have worked together with a number of schools, parent carers from the SEND Parent Stakeholder group, SENDIASS and Families in Partnership to develop a parent carer engagement toolkit for schools.

Parent carers of children and young people with SEND have told us that they can feel isolated and on the edge of the wider school community. We have co-produced this free toolkit to help schools to proactively engage with their parent carer engagement (as distinct from the wider school community), and it includes a range of ideas, practical examples, best practice, and tools to help.

It is designed to help you reflect on current practice and encourages you to involve your parent carer community in developing your engagement plan moving forwards. Families in Partnership, Worcestershire's parent carer forum, have worked with us on the project, and can offer free, practical support for you with this. Requests for EHC Needs Assessment and Annual Reviews

Further to our communication in January, SEND Service has completed its internal upgrade of our case management and information systems. Therefore from **Monday 17 April**, we will be expecting all schools to submit EHCNA requests and Annual Review paperwork via the Children's Services Portal using the 'SEND Referral' tab.

When making an EHCNA Request, although it shows that you have 15 days to complete the request, each time you save the application, the 15 days restarts, thus allowing you to complete the form over a longer period.

We also understand that there appears to be an anomaly with the portal regarding having more than 1 active EHCNA request on the portal at any given time. If you try to save two forms of the same type within the same session (you haven't logged out and back in between forms) the system over writes the previous form(s) with the details of the last saved form. If you save a form but log out and back in again you can save as many forms as you like without anything being overwritten. Using this as a work around for the time being will stop the issue but we are aware that this is far from ideal. As soon as we have a resolution, we will let you know.

We appreciate that you may also want to send additional documents to us to support the application, most of these can be submitted with the application, however the size of some documents maybe too large to submit. If this is the case (and only in these circumstances), please send the additional information only to senassessmentpsf@worcschildrenfirst.org.uk, with the child/young person's name and date of birth.

Update from Educational Psychologist Team

Experience of Service

We have been seeking feedback from the SENCos we work with and have had positive responses. Themes of what is working well from SENCo's perspectives are: the focus on solution finding; the communication between school, EP and families; involvement of families; clear feedback and the flexible, but organised use of time. Additionally, all those who responded felt that we listen to the views of SENCos, act on these and that we are accessible and approachable. We have also had positive comments, such as: *"The service didn't feel like an assessment but more of a wrap around support system which was very useful for all stakeholders to feel that they have a voice and a network of support."* We thank those who have already given their views.

As well as our traded work with schools, we seek feedback from parent/carers where a statutory assessment of their child's special educational needs has been undertaken by an EP. In the majority of cases the parent/carers felt that the interaction with the EP for the purposes of the assessment reflected their views, enabled their voice and this was reflected in the report that was produced. Where parent/carers have left queries, these have been responded to, and following one such conversation, this has led to the creation of any additional prompt tool that can be used with parent/carers to help them prepare for the conversation with the EP.

Early Years Inclusion Funding - Autumn Term 2023 applications

If you wish to request top up (GR4 challenge, exceptional or non NEF) inclusion funding for new children who will be attending in the Autumn Term 2023, please do so by the 2nd June 2023 on the Autumn Term 2023 on-line application which can be accessed here: https://forms.office.com/e/Sgx5xYFgYx

Remember if you have accessed GR4 challenge or exceptional we will send you a link to the monitoring forms which will extend the funding into the new terms.

New ADHD Referral Pathway

A transformation piece of work has been taking place within Community Paediatrics in order to improve and simplify the Community Paediatric ADHD referral pathway.

Moving forward the referral process will be split into two sections.

Section 1 – For completion by the child's parent/ guardian, allowing a parent/ guardian to self-refer their child for suspected ADHD.

Before a parent/carer can complete a referral, they will be asked to have attended at least one of the following courses:

- Understanding your child
- Understanding your child with additional needs
- Understanding your child's mental health and wellbeing
- Understanding your teenager's brain
- Triple P (Positive Parenting Programme)
- Understanding your teen with additional needs
- Understanding your child from 0-19 (a group specifically for dads/ father figures)
- Understanding your child from 0-19
- The Incredible Years
- The Incredible Years ASC (Autism Spectrum Condition)

All sessions are free to attend and run by trained staff and volunteers from the <u>Starting Well</u> <u>Partnership</u>.

All parents concerned that their child or young person might have ADHD, are encouraged to speak to professionals at school to discuss if the concerns are pervasive to the school setting. If school professionals do not share the same concerns as the parents, a period of monitoring within school maybe required prior to making a referral. Following completion of the chosen course(s) the strategies should be implemented over a period of at least 10 weeks to determine whether the child's behaviour has responded to the strategies offered. The child's progress should be monitored and recorded throughout this time, making note of any change. If after this time, the parent/carer has not seen a change in the child's behaviour, then it may be appropriate to refer for an ADHD assessment.

Section 2 – For completion by the child's school or education setting

Parents/carers will need to inform the school or education setting that they are intending to submit a referral to the ADHD Pathway and have completed section 1 of the referral process. Parent/carers will then request that section 2 be completed by the school or education setting.

The referral form will be available to be completed digitally via the Community Paediatrics website which will be shared prior to Go Live.

For parents/carers unable to access the referral form online, paper copies can be obtained from Schools and GPs and posted to: Community Paediatrics Service, Covercroft Centre, Colman Road, Droitwich, WR9 8QU.

Consultations and amendments have been implemented by collaborating with key stakeholder groups including GPs and Parent/carer groups.

As part of the information available, a flyer, leaflet and website content has been created.

Members of our team will be attending the conference on 14th June, where they will be available for questions.

TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Universal SEND Services Programme

The Whole School SEND and nasen <u>online SEND CPD units</u> continue to attract large numbers of education professionals, and we're always delighted to hear about all the learning that is being incorporated into practice and shared with colleagues.

Leading Reading Conference

Having worked with, and responded to, many different school contexts, Worcestershire Children First (WCF) recognises the positive impact our school children experience when supported through high quality provision and teaching to access their respective school curriculums – particularly reading. In order to achieve this, we have seen many middle and secondary schools needing to become more specialised with reading instruction and be able to confidently support children who may need adaptive teaching, or interventions when it comes to decoding, fluency and comprehension. This is an area I am sure you have also noticed yourself, and we are keen to work with our SENCOs, across all phases, to ensure we can support and develop our teachers to become the experts needed for our children.

Responding to this growing need and priority, WCF are hosting a conference this Summer focusing specifically on supporting our children to read. The conference **'Leading Reading'** will be hosted **Tuesday 4th July** as an all-day event. Our key note and guest speakers Professor Teresa Cremin; author and reading expert Chris Such; and Ofsted's HMI Kirsty Godfrey, a reading specialist and researcher. In addition, the option to attend additional specialised workshops on the day will allow WCF trainers to work directly with schools in a collaborative manner.

The day is aimed to ensure our teachers are equipped with the knowledge and expertise to support reading provision, including the understanding of how to teach reading for both pleasure and progress.

We believe this conference will offer your teachers the opportunity to access high quality professional development, with an understanding of how to apply strategies in their classroom – thus creating an inclusive environment that allows all children to access curriculum material. WCF Learning Support Team Training

The Learning Support Team are happy to announce a programme of training this year to enable teachers to tackle difficulties in their classroom with increased knowledge and confidence. The first of these sessions deals with children with handwriting difficulties.

Our training session on 4th July will look at some of the underlying causes of poor handwriting beyond fine motor difficulties and will give practical support to help CYP to overcome these difficulties. We are running this course as many schools are now asking for help in this area and the paediatric occupation therapy service do not involve themselves in handwriting issues. Off the shelf interventions focus on practising letter formation without exploring the precursors to this stage and are often not as effective as hoped. This session will help teachers to understand other factors that can affect handwriting legibility and speed.

Later in the year we are also running courses on Maths Difficulties, The difference between Phonics and Phonological Awareness along with our ever-popular Dyslexia Identification training. Our full range of training is available on the Worcestershire Children First CPD website <u>Schools and</u> <u>academies training directory (worcestershire.gov.uk)</u>

We can also offer bespoke training in schools as staff meetings, twilights or as part of a school training day. Recent reviews of our training showed 100% classed the training as good or excellent with comments such as "Clear and well structured. Really useful - learnt lots of info I didn't know and strategies. Relaxed training session, useful content, knowledgeable delivery."

******Shine a Light****** – sharing effective practice

Thank you to The Chantry School for sharing their story...

We have been working hard as a school community to support an autistic pupil to learn alongside his peers. We were worried we couldn't meet his needs when he was shrieking and banging his head repeatedly, but we kept looking for ways to help.

Our whole TA team became trained in Team Teach, we used Trauma and Mental Health informed approaches, we met with family, we educated his peers, we sought advice from the CCN team, we reflected each time there was an incident and adapted strategies. After a period of time working on body scanning (advised by CCN Team) and social stories, we've had a few milestones and we are so proud of him.

The first was him sharing unprompted that his tummy felt tense because he was angry (he reflected and explained why) and then loose later after the incident.

The second was when his TA noticed early signs of him dysregulating and he was able to share how he felt using the scale. He described feeling annoyed (5) his body feeling tight and that he had

crossed his arms. The TA suggested a walk to help him, he agreed and then returned to class feeling loose again back down to a 2.

Third, he has been on a school trip to the theatre (after a lot of pre-work), been to dance club and the school disco. The latter his family, never imagined he would do!

And finally, his peers are starting to understand him, telling adults when they think he is struggling, interacting with him positively in the corridor and outside of school, all helping him to feel the valued member of our community that he is.

We would like to use the SEND Bulletin as a platform to share effective inclusive practice and 'shine a light' on what is working well within Worcestershire schools and settings to improve the experiences and outcomes for children and young people with SEND.
