Dingley's Promise, specialists in early years SEND education, are opening 2 enhanced provisions in Worcester and Droitwich. The centres will provide specialist learn through play sessions with targeted child-centred interventions and an enriched and varied curriculum. Our aim is to support developmental progress and support with transition to the child's next setting to give every child the best start in life.

The centre will also offer outreach support for families of children with SEND, providing practical and emotional support as well as signposting to local services and helping families to access their entiltements. We will offer coffee mornings, stay and play sessions and information sessions to develop networks of support. There will also be holiday playschemes for children which offer an array of themed activities for children to engage in, whilst providing vital respite for parents.

Physical Disability Outreach Support Team





Supporting children with physical disabilities and/or complex health needs in early years settings

Overview of the Physical Disability Outreach Team:

- There are two teams -one in the north based at Chadsgrove School and one in the South based at Regency High School;
- The South team is comprised of assessment teachers who have a background in teaching in special schools for many years;
- We have a caseload of over 200 children aged 2 to 19-some have very complex needs who we see regularly and others we see infrequently or at key points in their school life e.g. when they move schools;
- We aim to support children in early years settings and schools so they are included as much as possible alongside their peers in their local nursery or school.

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Physical Disabilities Explained

- The PD Outreach team supports children with a diagnosed physical disability and or medical condition which affects their physical functioning and access to a mainstream nursery curriculum. This includes a wide range of conditions such as cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy and spina bifida.
- Some children do not have a diagnosis but their physical functioning is such that they require input and the provision of specialist equipment to access the curriculum. E.g. children with global developmental delay, some children with Downs Syndrome.
- Some children have experienced medical trauma which has had impact on their physical functioning e.g. Acquired Brain Injury, sporting accident.
- Some children have co-ordination difficulties, particularly in early years or may be delayed in physical skills such as walking and need support for a short period of time.
- Some children may have learning difficulties and sensory impairments in addition to a physical disability.

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Complex Health Needs Explained

- Children with complex health needs are supported by our team alongside health professionals such as the community nursing team -Orchard Service, specialist Epilepsy Nurse -Cheryl Byrd and other specialist nursing teams for continence, skin care and oncology.
- Children often have long term medical conditions which impact on their ability to access the nursery environment without some form of adult support and adaptations. We support post-operative children also.
- Such medical needs include children with long term heart conditions, breathing conditions, complex continence needs, complex epilepsy, as well as children going through treatment for cancer. Children diagnosed with diabetes may require additional support.
- There are a number of young children who require tube feeding in nurseriestraining is provided by the Orchard Team.

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Top Ten Tips For Creating A Physical Disability Friendly Environment:

- 1. Be inclusive from the first visit -welcome families and children and see solutions rather than difficulties, sometimes solutions are very inexpensive e.g. provision of a grab rail -if works need to be done -plan for them, consult owners -they will benefit a wide range of children who may attend the setting in the future;
- 2. Involve professionals and gain as much information on the child and their needs as you can and ensure support and paperwork is in place prior to the child starting -work as a team -as many relevant staff as possible should know about the individual needs of the child with physical disability -good practitioners regularly evaluate their practice, training must be started before the child starts and be on-going as the child's needs change;
- 3. Parents/carers are the experts as is the child themselves, often they will have worked out a solution before you consult them;
- 4. Be creative with your environment, creating routes and clearing clutter to make spaces for a child with disability to get about can be hugely beneficial for all children in early years, not just children with physical disabilities;
- 5. Look at all areas of the curriculum and nursery -if it is not possible to make reasonable adjustments e.g. there are stairs/the environment cannot be adapted, what alternatives can be offered?;
- 6. Simple solutions for inclusive practice often work best, e.g. move more mobile children to the area the child with physical disability is playing rather than keep moving the child with a disability, make sure any equipment the child needs is in place and used as recommended as soon as possible e,g, a bath step;
- 7. No child learns well unless they can access their environment safely and comfortably -think of the best equipment to use for each activity-specialist chair?/Wheelchair? Bench? Standing frame? Walker? -all can be used creatively;
- 8. Do not sit the child with physical disability on their own, even if they are in separate seating e.g. they cannot sit on the carpet -make sure they have a friend;
- 9. Children with physical disabilities may have individual targets such as regular physic routines -incorporate these into your planning in a fun and creative way -physical activities can be incorporated into movement sessions which will benefit all children;
- 10. children are very adaptable, they learn from each other and even young children quickly give time and space to a child with disabilities -communicate sensitively and set high expectations-most importantly have fun and enjoy every moment!

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How to Complete Health Care Plans and Risk Assessments

- Involve professionals and parents/carers -meet together and go through all areas of the plan as a team;
- The health care plan and risk assessments need to be reviewed regularly especially with young children who often progress with their skills; medical needs can change -make sure they are updated;
- The risk assessments for activities and the environment will be the same as for all children with specific additions for children with physical disabilities/medical needs -build on what you have, do not start from scratch.
- The PD Outreach team has 2 moving and handling trainers -we will complete training with staff and write physical management risk assessment and plans in conjunction with physios for settings.

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How to Refer to the Team:

Who Can Refer?

- Most children are referred via the Early Years Inclusion Process via Liquid logic.
- Parents/Carers.
- Sencos from nurseries, pre-schools.
- Area Sencos/Portage.
- Heath professionals -physios, pediatricians, OTs, Speech and Language Therapists.
- Parental/carer consent is required prior to a referral.

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The Support Parents/Carers Will Receive:

- Regular communication from the referral process in relation to their child to build up a relationship that lasts many years -some of our children are doing degrees and we are still in touch with their families!;
- Offer advice on accessible nurseries and following on from this accessible schools;
- Assist with transition and often lead on transition into school;
- Liaise about the EHCP process if relevant or any other support their child may need in relation to accessing nursery and then school;
- Offer advice on support available in conjunction with other early years colleagues e.g. in relation to all areas such as sport/swimming/DLA.

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The Support Early Years Setting Will Receive:

- **Early Years:**
- On-going assessment of the child's needs.
- Provide reports to contribute to EHCP process.
- Provide advice to parents/carers re accessible nurseries/schools.
- Liaise with physio/OTs to ensure appropriate equipment/furniture is in place so child can access the environment.
- Offer support to parents/carers re assessment process.
- Training to setting on risk assessment of physical needs, safe moving and handling, fire evacuation, IEP targets, promoting independence, safe use of equipment, use of ICT and disability awareness and access to learning.
- Co-ordinate transition to school and promote effective communication between settings, including parents/carers.


THINGS WE DO DAY TO **DAY...**

- We have a lending library where parents and children can borrow a book, story sack or game to use at home.
- We offer settling in sessions for all children but we are so flexible that these can be extended for as long as needed, we also allow parents to sit in the room upstairs, we feel this helps makes the transition easier and smoother for them.
- Since September we have started a sign of the week (signalong) we upload to our Facebook page so parents can learn it to.
- We share activity ideas for example playdough recipes and attach them to our newsletter and upload them to tapestry.
- All our children receive free snack, and there are no consumable charges for any of our parents. We offer pay weekly for parents that do pay fees.



THINGS WE DO TO HELP OUR FAMILIES...

- We can help families with foodbank donations and we have also had families in the past whose fridges have broken, we have done a full shop for them.
- We also have donations from Waitrose and Tesco of Fairshare food that we leave out for our parents to help themselves to.
- The Salvation Army had uniform donated from Asda which was then given to our parents.
- We share activity ideas for example playdough recipes and attach them to our newsletter and upload them to tapestry.
- We also share cheap and free things to do in the school holidays with their children.
- We work closely with our Droitwich Salvation army charity shop, if we have families that are struggling for coats or shoes etc, we can access these things from our charity shop.







THINGS WE DO TO SUPPORT OUR FAMILIES

- We offer regular coffee mornings for all parents, but we also have coffee mornings for our SEN parents and we have people come in and speak, such as Dingleys promise and past parents who have SEN children. We find our previous parents a great support for worried parents and parents that are worrying about specialist placement, so parents find this extremely useful.
 - We hold regular stay and plays for families to come into pre-school and get involved with activities with their children.
 - We have a detailed transition for our SEN children to school, we have meetings with schools and parents and talk through any worries or concerns.
 - We have in the past had anxious parents who were nervous about their child going to school so we have gone with them to visit settings to help them feel at ease.
 - When we go out on trips we welcome parents along, so that we don't exclude our SEN children.
 - We invite parents to community events within the salvation army as well as the children's events at preschool.
 - We have in the past facilitated supervised contact for one of our parents, so that it didn't disrupt the child's nursery day, and to save mum having to travel to Birmingham.



WORKING IN PARTNERSHIP WITH PROFESSIONALS...



- We have a partnership with action for children, they come out and deliver a few different workshops for parents, recent ones are healthy eating and positive behaviour. they also ran meal masters which was a course for parents to make meals on a budget and how to make your food go further, all parents that did the course left with a slow cooker and some pantry food items.
- We have Speech and Language therapists coming out to our setting regularly, this is especially helpful if we have parents struggling to get their children to appointments.
- We have health visitors coming out to us to do 2 year checks and SOGS assessments. This is if parents are struggling to get to appointments with their child.
- Starting well partnership come out and do sessions with out children, for example oral health, healthy eating and they regularly give us free toothbrushes and toothpaste for our children with fun activity packs too. We have also a partnership with Gentle Dental in Droitwich, where all our children can go and be registered and they often come out and do workshops with us.








Event for children with any level of deafness from the Sensory Impairment Team




