As we begin the summer term, I hope that preparations for upcoming assessments and exams are going smoothly for both children and staff. This is a busy and important time in schools, and I would like to thank everyone for their continued hard work and dedication in supporting pupils to achieve their best.

This week the Government has announced <u>new measures to reduce school uniform costs for families</u>. As part of the Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill, schools in England will be limited to requiring no more than three branded uniform items, excluding ties. This change is expected to save families an estimated £73 million annually, benefiting parents of over 4 million children. The initiative aims to alleviate financial pressure on families, ensuring that uniform costs do not hinder children's access to education.

A full programme of First Aid and Health and Safety training is now available for the summer term, including Emergency First Aid, Paediatric First Aid, Fire Warden Training, and Managing Safely courses. Whether you are leading visits, supporting day-to-day school operations, or acting as a designated first aider, there is training to suit your role. 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

Creating Inclusive Practice through 'PINS' so ALL Children Thrive (Partnership for Inclusion of Neurodiversity in Schools)

We all have different thought patterns and processes; it is part of the natural variation of neurodiversity. The Partnerships for Inclusion of Neurodiversity in Schools (PINS) project is a new national initiative to support good outcomes for <u>all pupils</u> in mainstream primary schools, by embracing neurodiversity. Worcestershire has an exciting opportunity for 30 primary schools to join the national PINS programme and be part of this new way of thinking.

By recognising we all have different cognitive processes, PINS benefits all pupils because the changes in practice will provide the conditions for *all* pupils to thrive. PINS aims to work in partnership with primary schools, parent carer forums and local services to develop inclusive provision. The project will focus on strengthening knowledge, skills and improving learning environments to better meet the needs of ALL pupils and improve outcomes for children with neurodiverse needs. It achieves this by:



What does each school receive?

- Support to Develop Co-production with Parent Carers
- 37 hours of funded external expert support
- Resources & New Ways of Working
- Networking Across Schools & Services

To identify support needs schools will complete a self-assessment tool. A multi-agency project group (made of up Local Authority, NHS Herefordshire and Worcestershire and Worcestershire Parent Carer Forum) will work with schools to understand what is working well and where support is needed. A package of support will be discussed with the school and commissioned by the project group. Support will be purchased by LA/NHS from a combination of local system providers (health, education etc), external programmes and private providers.

Eligibility, Selection & Timescale

We intend to allocate PINS to 5 primary schools in each of the 6 Worcestershire Districts. All schools will be eligible to submit an expression of interest. The programme will run from April 2025-March 2026.

Lumi Nova - First, Primary and Middle schools

FAO: All teaching staff, Pastoral Leads, SENCos, DSLs.

Action: Please share widely with parents.

Over 70% of families heard about <u>Lumi Nova</u> through schools. So, a massive thank you to all those schools that have been promoting Lumi Nova to parents of children with mild to moderate anxieties. The most common goal set by children have been to:

- address anxieties around making a mistake on schoolwork or in a test and
- worries about feeling comfortable going to school.

Many schools have accessed either a <u>Lumi Nova Discovery webinar</u> to learn more or shared Lumi Nova with parents broadly or through one to one parent/teacher conversations. The next professional's webinars are on Tuesday 13 May, 2pm and Friday 6th June, 1pm.

Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025 (Martyn's Law) receives Royal Assent

The Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025, known as Martyn's Law, received Royal Assent on Thursday 3 April 2025.

This Act delivers the Government's manifesto commitment to strengthen the security of public premises and events, including education settings. The Government intends for there to be an implementation period of at least 24 months before the Act comes into force.

Free breakfast clubs - early adopters begin rollout

Early adopter breakfast clubs are launching from the beginning of this term as part of the Government's Plan for Change.

750 schools have been funded to provide access to a free, universal breakfast club lasting at least 30 minutes that includes food. Find out more on the breakfast clubs page.

The government is committed to offering a free breakfast club in every state-funded school with primary-aged pupils in England. Further details on the national rollout will be available in due course.

Raising awareness of discounted social broadband tariffs

Home broadband is increasingly essential for supporting learning. Households receiving benefits such as Universal Credit could be eligible for discounted social tariffs, helping them stay connected at lower costs.

The Government recognise the role of schools, colleges and others in engaging students and their families and encourage you to signpost these offers to eligible households.

Including breastfeeding learning in your PSHE curriculum: webinar for secondary schools - why and how?

A webinar to share teaching resources designed to raise awareness and normalise breastfeeding for use in secondary school and will include why teaching about breastfeeding is important for young people and the health of future generations.

Secondary Schools may wonder why... but did you know:

- The Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health recommends integrating breastfeeding education into Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) classes, particularly in secondary schools.
- Statutory guidance for Relationship, Sex and Health Education requires pupils, by the end of secondary school to know.
 - the roles and responsibilities of parents with respect to raising of children including the characteristics of successful parenting and
 - o the characteristics and evidence of what constitutes a healthy lifestyle and
 - o how to maintain healthy eating and the links between a poor diet and health risks

Learning outcomes:

- Understand the data about breastfeeding nationally and locally
- Why teach breastfeeding?
- Understand where breastfeeding learning fits into the curriculum
- Feel confident to deliver breastfeeding sessions as part of PSHE lessons in safe and nonjudgemental environments
- Deliver breastfeeding teaching sessions

Moderation - progress and assessment in Reception *NEW*

This session supports the quality assurance of teacher assessment judgements and provides a valuable opportunity for professional discussion and development through collaboration with colleagues. "It is important for teachers to build a shared understanding of the ELG's and the EYFS statutory framework."

These sessions for teachers will enable Head teachers to meet their duty for ensuring their teachers attend training courses and moderation meetings within schools and with other schools and to use quality assurance processes to ensure that the data accurately reflects the attainment of the current cohort of children.

The sessions will provide an opportunity to discuss and gain a shared view of the consistency and accuracy of judgements being made. They are also an opportunity to discuss different ways to share information with Year 1 colleagues of the children's strengths and areas of development so that colleagues can meet their needs and carry on their learning.

Write, record and produce your own songs with Severn Arts

Severn Arts' popular Studio Sessions are back again with a brand-new theme: 'songwriting'!

Students aged 11-16 are invited to sign up to the sessions where they will get the chance to write, record and produce their own songs to an industry standard. Experiment with DJ decks, learn all about mic techniques and have a go at using synths to make your very own song!

Studio Sessions aim to give young people the chance to learn how to record and produce their own music, using state-of-the-art drum machines, synthesizers, midi instruments and Logic Pro software. Students work alongside Severn Arts teachers, who specialise in production and development as well as industry professionals.

Studio Sessions: songwriting will take place across five weeks every Saturday 9.30-11.30am starting 10th May.

Sessions are split between time on their Music Box bus and using instruments in their offices in Worcester. Places are already filling up fast, so be sure to book soon! The cost is £60 for all five sessions, however there are a limited number of free places for those on lower incomes.
